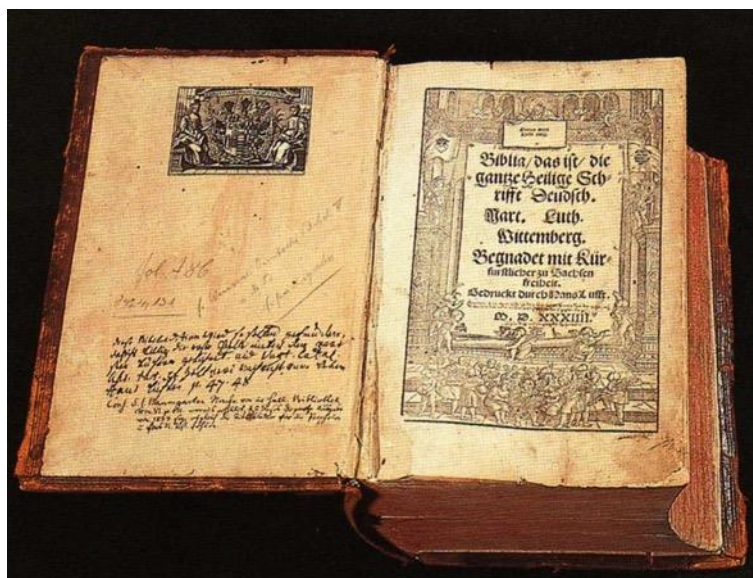

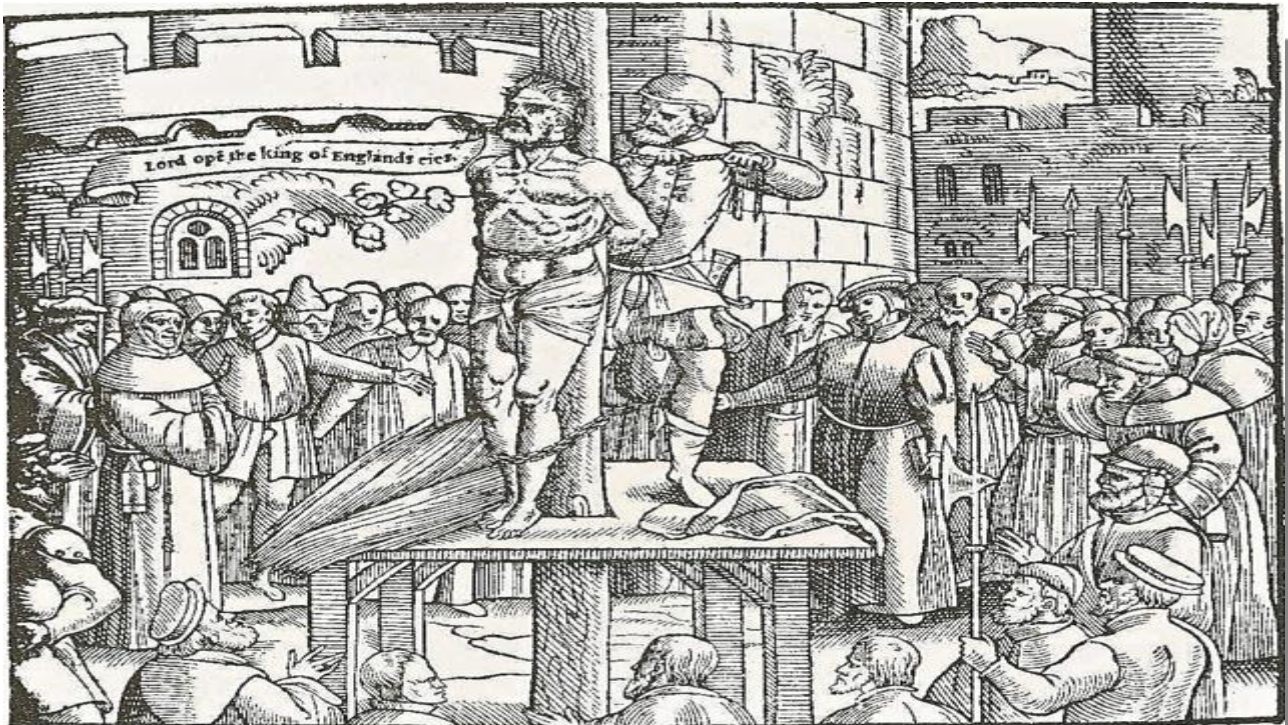

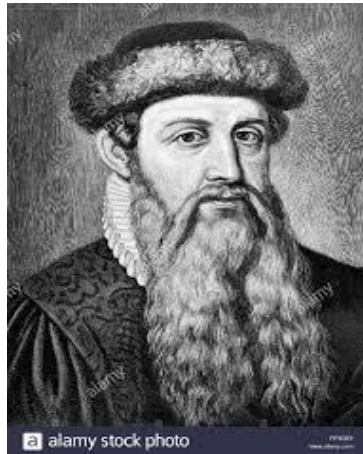
I perceived how that it was impossible to establish the lay people in any truth^[1] except the Scripture were plainly laid before their eyes in their mother tongue.

Sometimes spelled **Tindall**, **Tindill**, **Tyndall**; A 16th century scholar and translator who became a leading figure in the Protestant reformism towards the end of his life. He was influenced by the work of Desiderius Erasmus, who made the Greek New Testament available in Europe, and Martin Luther. Tyndale was the first to translate considerable parts of the Bible into English, for a public, lay readership.

While a number of partial and complete translations had been made from the seventh century onward, particularly during the 14th century, Tyndale's was the first English translation to draw directly from Hebrew and Greek texts, and the first to take advantage of the new medium of print, which allowed for its wide distribution. This was taken to be a direct challenge to the hegemony of both the Roman Catholic church and the English church and state.

Tyndale also wrote, in 1530, *The Practyse of Prelates*, opposing Henry VIII's divorce on the grounds that it contravened scriptural law. In 1535, Tyndale was arrested by church authorities and jailed in the castle of Vilvoorde outside Brussels for over a year. He was tried for heresy, strangled and burnt at the stake in 1536. The Tyndale Bible, as it was known, continued to play a key role in spreading Reformation ideas across Europe. The fifty-four independent scholars who created the King James Version of the bible in 1611 drew significantly on Tyndale's translations. One estimation suggests the New Testament in the King James Version is 83% Tyndale's, and the Old Testament 76%.

The Advent of the Printing Press by Gutenberg

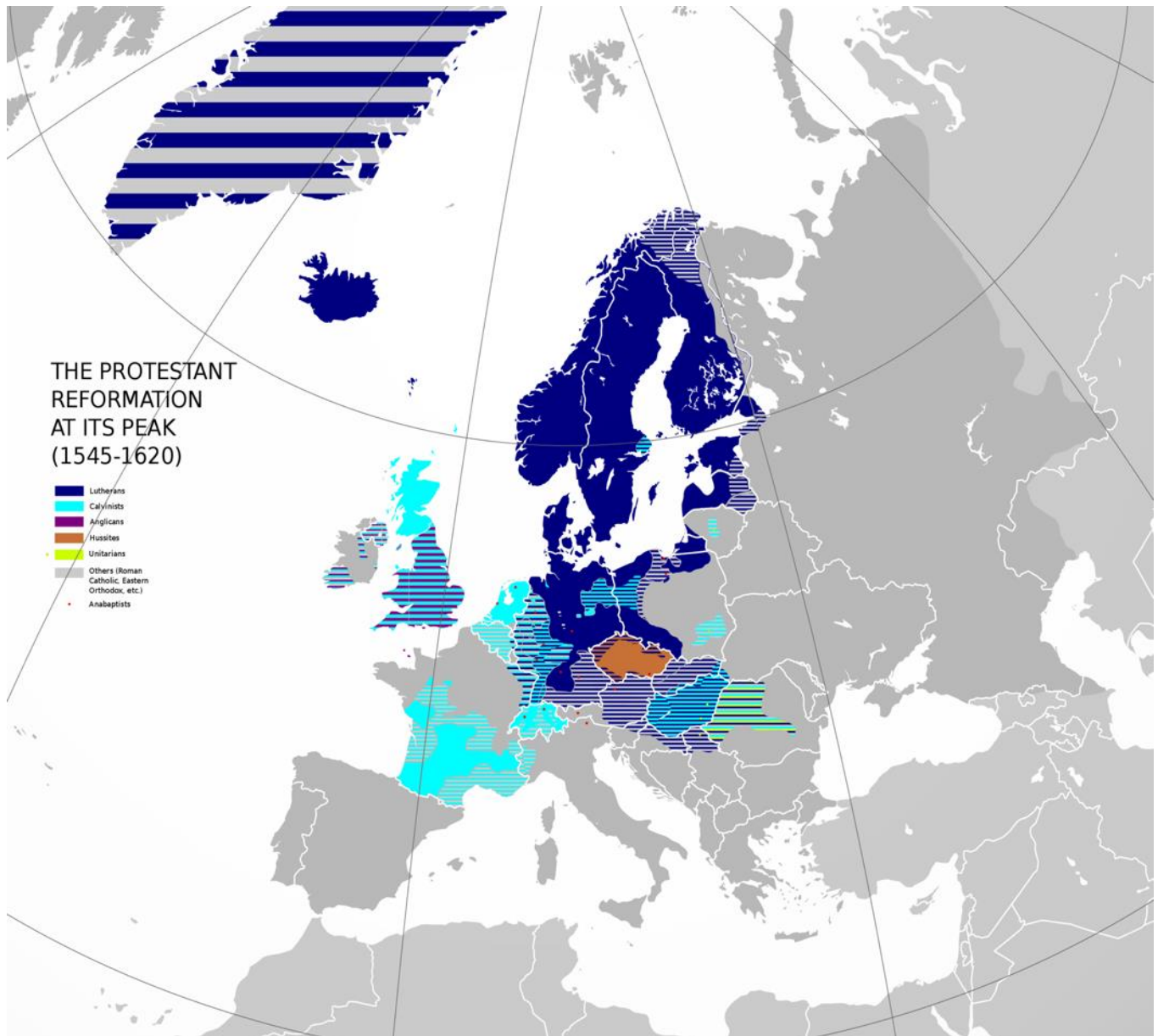

His introduction of mechanical [movable type](#) printing to Europe started the [Printing Revolution](#) and is regarded as a milestone of the second millennium, ushering in the [modern period](#) of human history. --Wikipedia

This ultimately made the Bible available to the masses

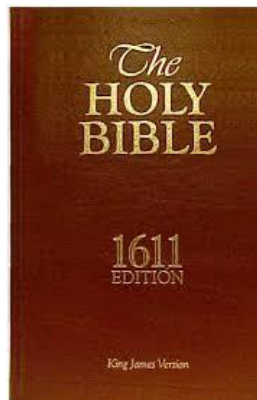


The Reformation spreads through Europe





In 1611 he appointed 54 learned scholars in the making of this new translation from the original Greek and Hebrew into English. For the Old Testament they used the ben Asher text, and for the New Testament they used the Greek text of Erasmus and a Greek and Latin text of the 6th Century found by Theodore Beza.

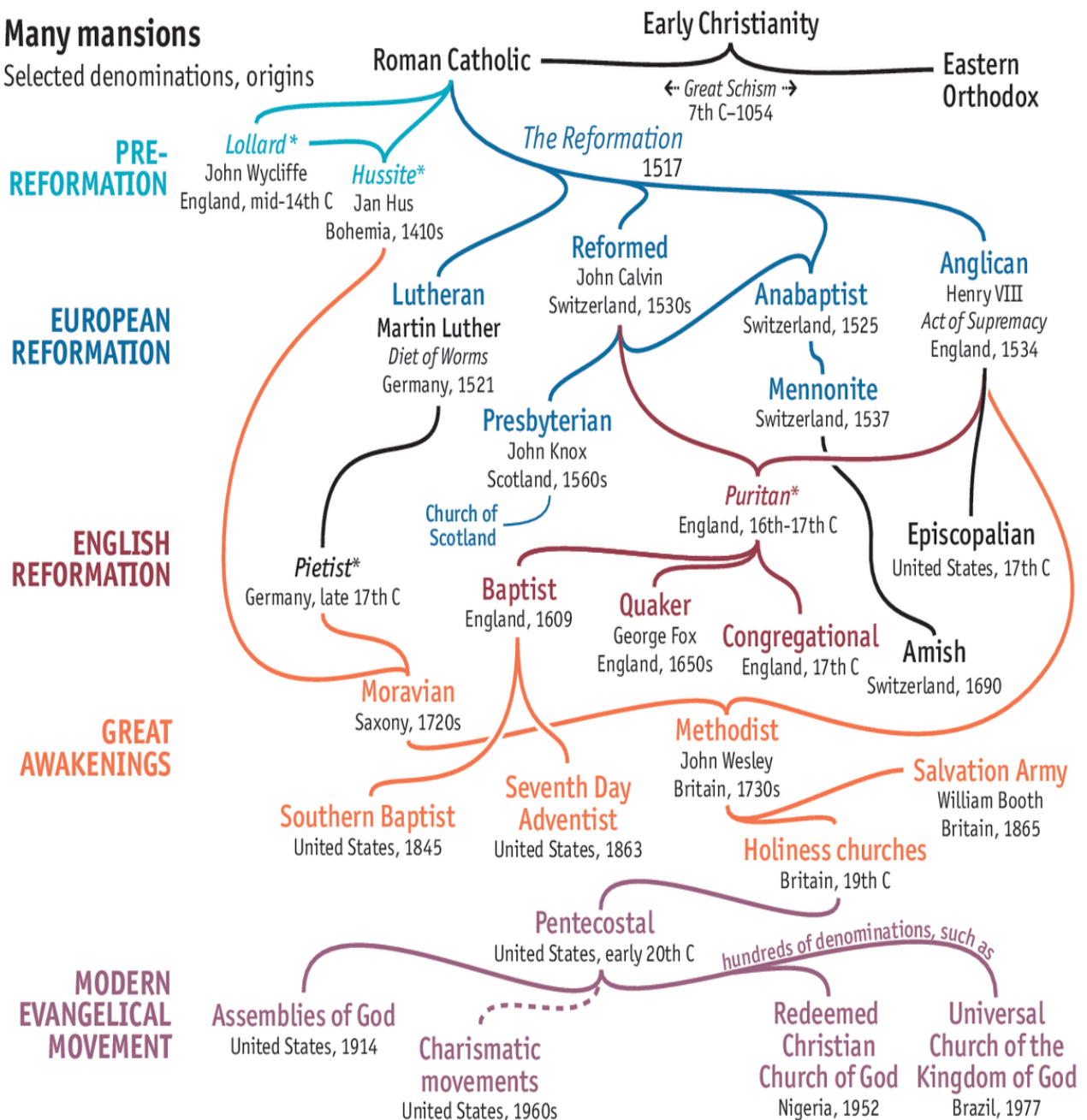


The Bible has been translated into many languages from the biblical languages of Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek. As of October 2019, the full Bible has been translated into **698 languages**, the New Testament has been translated into an additional **1,548 languages** and Bible portions or stories into **1,138** other languages.

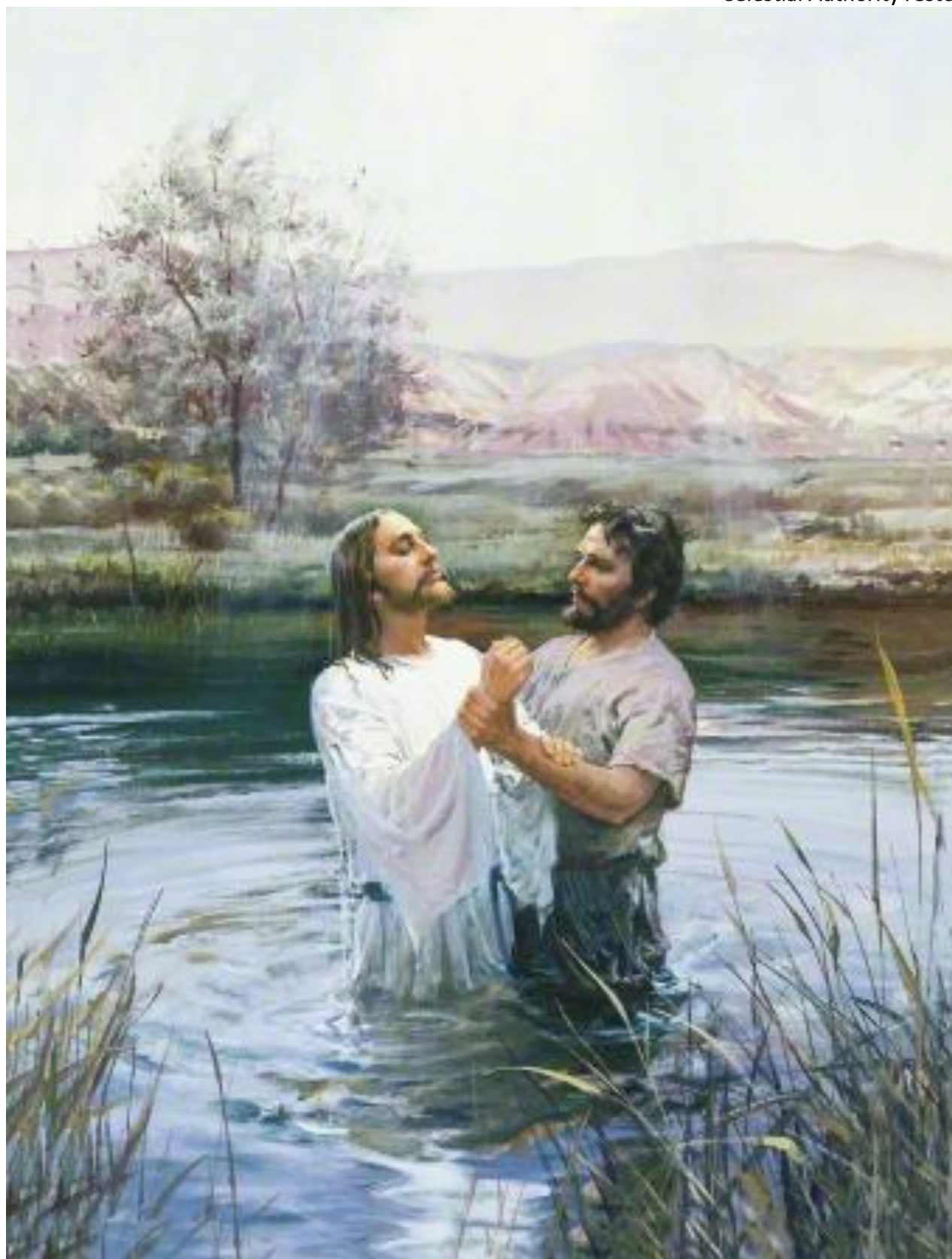

President Russell M. Nelson, in medical circles, was known as Dr. Nelson, an international renowned surgeon and medical researcher. An MD at 23, having graduated with highest honors. He completed his four-year medical degree in three years. He was president of the Society for Vascular Surgery. “After three challenging years, they developed the first machine that formed the functions of a patient’s heart and lungs during open-heart surgery.

President Oaks Editor-in-Chief, *The University of Chicago Law Review*, 1956–57. Law Clerk to Chief Justice Earl Warren, United States Supreme Court, 1957–58. Professor, The University of Chicago Law School, 1961–71. Legal Counsel, Bill of Rights Committee, Illinois Constitutional Convention, 1970. President, Brigham Young University, 1997-80. Chairman of the Board, Public Broadcasting Service, 1980–85 (board member, 1977–85). Justice, Utah Supreme Court, 1981–84. Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, 1984–present.

President Eyring: Among other callings in the LDS Church, Eyring has served as a regional representative, bishop and member of the Sunday School General Board.^[15] Eyring served as an early-morning seminary teacher early in his time as a professor at Stanford University, and as bishop of the Stanford singles’ ward later on. Eyring served as president of Ricks College from 1971 to 1977, as counselor to Presiding Bishop Robert D. Hales from 1985 to 1992, and as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy, from 1992 to 1995. Following the death of church president Howard W. Hunter, Eyring was sustained to the church’s Quorum of the Twelve Apostles on April 1, 1995 and ordained an apostle later that week.

The Relief Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints

The Relief Society is a philanthropic and educational women's [organization](#) of [The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints](#) (LDS Church). It was founded in 1842 in [Nauvoo, Illinois, United States](#), and has more than **16 million members in over 188 countries and territories**.^[2] The Relief Society is often referred to by the church and others as "**one of the oldest and largest women's organizations in the world**."^{[3][4][5][6][7][8][9]}

Relief Society has approximately 7.1 million members. We have over 31,000 congregations around the world, and each has a local Relief Society president. That's 31,000 women (and each president has two counselors or assistants — a total of 93,000 women) helping to lead and direct the work of the Church in their local congregations.

Purpose: Gospel Instruction, women's familial support, humanitarian aid

Beginnings

In the spring of 1842 [Sarah Granger Kimball](#) and her seamstress, Margaret A. Cook, discussed combining their efforts to sew clothing for workers constructing the [Latter Day Saints' Nauvoo Temple](#). They determined to invite their neighbors to assist by creating a Ladies' Society. Kimball asked [Eliza R. Snow](#) to write a constitution and by-laws for the organization for submission to [President of the Church Joseph Smith](#) for review. After reviewing the documents, Smith called them "the best he had ever seen" but said, "this is not what you want. Tell the sisters their offering is accepted of the Lord, and He has something better for them than a written constitution. ... I will organize the women. .. after a pattern of the priesthood."^{[12][13]}

The general presidency of the Relief Society serves under the direction of the Church's [First Presidency](#). [Sister Jean B. Bingham](#) is the current Relief Society president. Her counselors are [Sister Sharon Eubank](#) and [Sister Reyna I. Aburto](#). They have been serving since April 2017.

Within the structure of the Church, women have opportunities to be leaders, give sermons during worship services and offer congregational prayers. They take an active role in the Church's [welfare program](#) by teaching self-reliance principles and helping resolve individual temporary and long-term needs. Joseph Smith explained the purpose of the Relief Society was "relief of the poor, the destitute, the widow and the orphan, and for the exercise of all benevolent purposes."

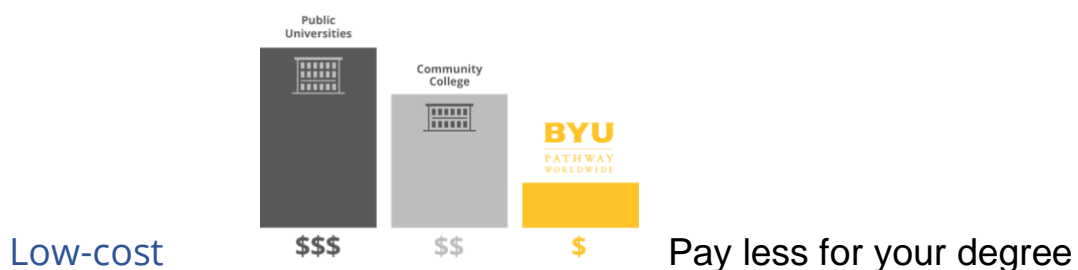

Tithing

In keeping with the biblical practice of tithes, Latter-day Saints offer one-tenth of their income to the Church. These funds are used for:

- Providing buildings or places of worship for members around the world. We have thousands of such buildings and continue to open more, sometimes several in a week.
- Providing education programs, including support for our universities and our seminary and institute programs.
- Supporting the Church's worldwide missionary program.
- Building and operating more than 300 temples around the world and the administration of the world's largest family history program.
- Supporting the Church's welfare programs and humanitarian aid, which serve people around the world — both members of the Church as well as those who are not members.

Fast Offerings

On the first Sunday of the month, healthy members of the Church are encouraged to fast for two consecutive meals and donate to the Church the money they would have spent on food. These funds help those in local congregations, where Mormon leaders confidentially allocate funds to the needy, with the ultimate goal being eventual self-reliance.

Humanitarian Aid

The Church has joined in more than 200 major disaster assistance efforts, including the 2011 Japan earthquake and tsunami, the 2010 Haiti earthquake, the 2010 Chile earthquake, the 2010 Pakistan flooding, the 2009 Samoa tsunami, the 2009 Philippines typhoon, the 2009 Indonesia earthquake, the 2008 Ethiopia famine and many others. Naturally, the Church undertakes these projects without regard to the nationality or religion of the recipients.

Humanitarian Work

The Church's humanitarian work primarily helps those in need who are not members of the church.

In 2020 and 2021, in response to supply issues experienced during the pandemic, 2,800 truckloads of commodities from the Church's storehouse system were delivered to nearly 400 food banks, homeless shelters, and other charitable organizations across the U.S. This equated to more than 82 million meals for those in need.

In 2021, the Church supported 135 mobility projects, such as wheelchairs, in 57 countries and territories; hosted 3,000 blood drives, resulting in 100,000 units donated; and assisted seven major immunization campaigns, including significant financial donations to help UNICEF take COVID-19 immunizations to dozens of countries.

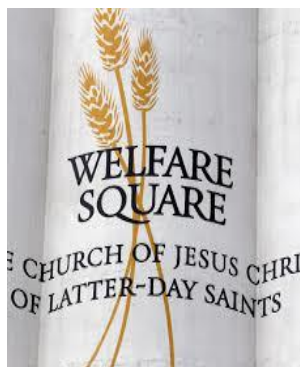
Storehouses provide the same types of goods found in any grocery store, including canned goods, condiments, cooking products, fresh produce, milk, meat, and pasta. Personal hygiene products and household cleaning supplies are also available. "...These are goods that money cannot buy. No price tag is put on the time, effort, and love so generously contributed to the common good of those in need."

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To Qualify for a Temple Recommend

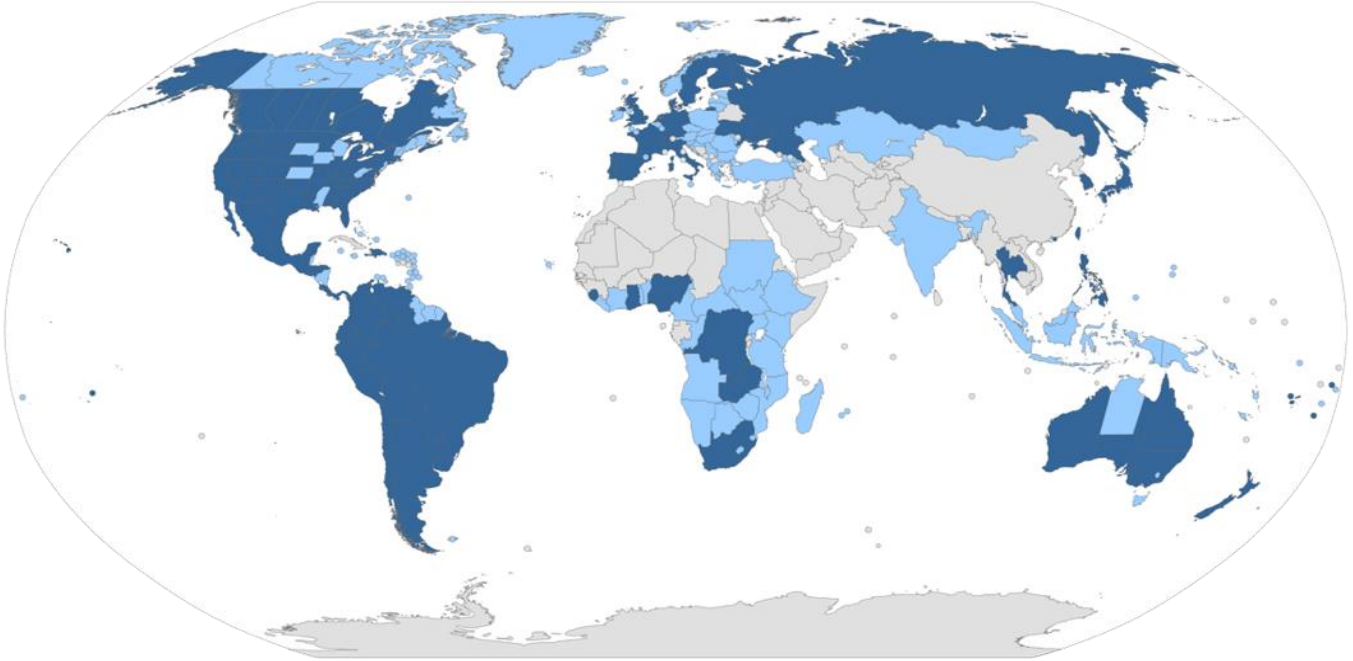
An LDS Church member must faithfully answer a series of questions which affirm the individual's adherence to essential Church doctrine.

The questions address the following:

Faith in and testimony of God the Father, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Ghost.

- Testimony of the atonement of Jesus Christ.
- Testimony of the Restoration of the Gospel.
- Support of the President of the Church and his authority, and other general authorities and local church leaders.
- Living the law of chastity.
- Relationships with family members as being in harmony with church teachings.
- Support for or affiliation with any group or individual with teachings or practices that are not in agreement with church teachings.
- Making a good faith effort to keep the covenants the individual has made, to attend church meetings and keep their life in harmony with the gospel.
- Honesty in dealings with others.
- Paying a full tithe.
- Keeping the Word of Wisdom.
- Payment of and keeping current on child support or alimony, if applicable.
- If already attending the temple, does the individual keep the covenants made in the temple and wear the temple garment "night and day" according to the covenants made in the temple.
- Making a full confession of any serious sins to church leaders.
- Regarding oneself worthy to enter the temple and take part in the ordinances within.

Many Lost Lives

Travel across the plains and mountains in covered wagons, pulling handcarts, or even on foot allowed for only primitive cooking, usually over an open fire and often scanty fuel. Families traveled fifteen to twenty miles a day, often eating cold stew, beans, or porridge three times a day.

All along those hundreds of miles of treacherous and difficult trail, the settlers carried the necessary supplies for survival. Food carried in the wagons had to be lightweight and nourishing and to keep well. When the supplies were gone, the pioneers wrested a living from the land. Their intuition plus their instinct for survival taught them to draw the best from the land in plant and animal nourishment. Impoverished, they learned to eat the tender sego-lily root, the nettle, and the various herbs and grasses that provided sustenance during the trek and early days of settlement.

The westward migrants usually began their journey with rations that included flour, bacon, and dried apples. The prices of food listed in St. Louis in 1847 give a clue to the kinds of provisions they carried: cornmeal, 25¢ a bushel; ginger, 11¢ a pound; lard, 3½¢ a pound; dried apples, 50¢ a bushel.

A recommended list of provisions for a family of five to equip them for the pioneer wilderness journey was published in the *Nauvoo (Illinois) Neighbor* on October 29, 1845. It included the following:

1 good strong wagon box well covered

2 or 3 good yoke of oxen between the age of 4 and 10 years.
 2 or more milch cows.
 1 or more good beefs.
 3 sheep if they can be obtained.
 1000 lbs. of flour or other bread, or bread stuffs in good sacks.
 1 good musket or rifle to each male over the age of twelve years.
 1 lb. powder.
 4 lbs. lead
 100 [lbs.] sugar
 1 [lb.] cayenne pepper
 ½lb. mustard
 10 [lbs.] rice for each family
 1 [lb.] cinnamon
 ½ [lb.] cloves
 1 doz. nutmegs.
 25 lbs. salt
 10 [lbs.] dried apples
 1 bush. of beans
 A few lbs. of dried beef or bacon.
 5 lbs. dried peaches.
 20 [lbs.] pumpkin
 25 [lbs.] seed grain
 20 lbs. of soap each family.
 4 or 5 fish hooks and lines
 Cooking utensils to consist of bake kettle, fryingpan
 Tin cups, plates, knives, forks, spoons, and pans as few as will do.
 A good tent and furniture to each 2 families.
 Clothing and bedding to each family, not to exceed 500 pounds.

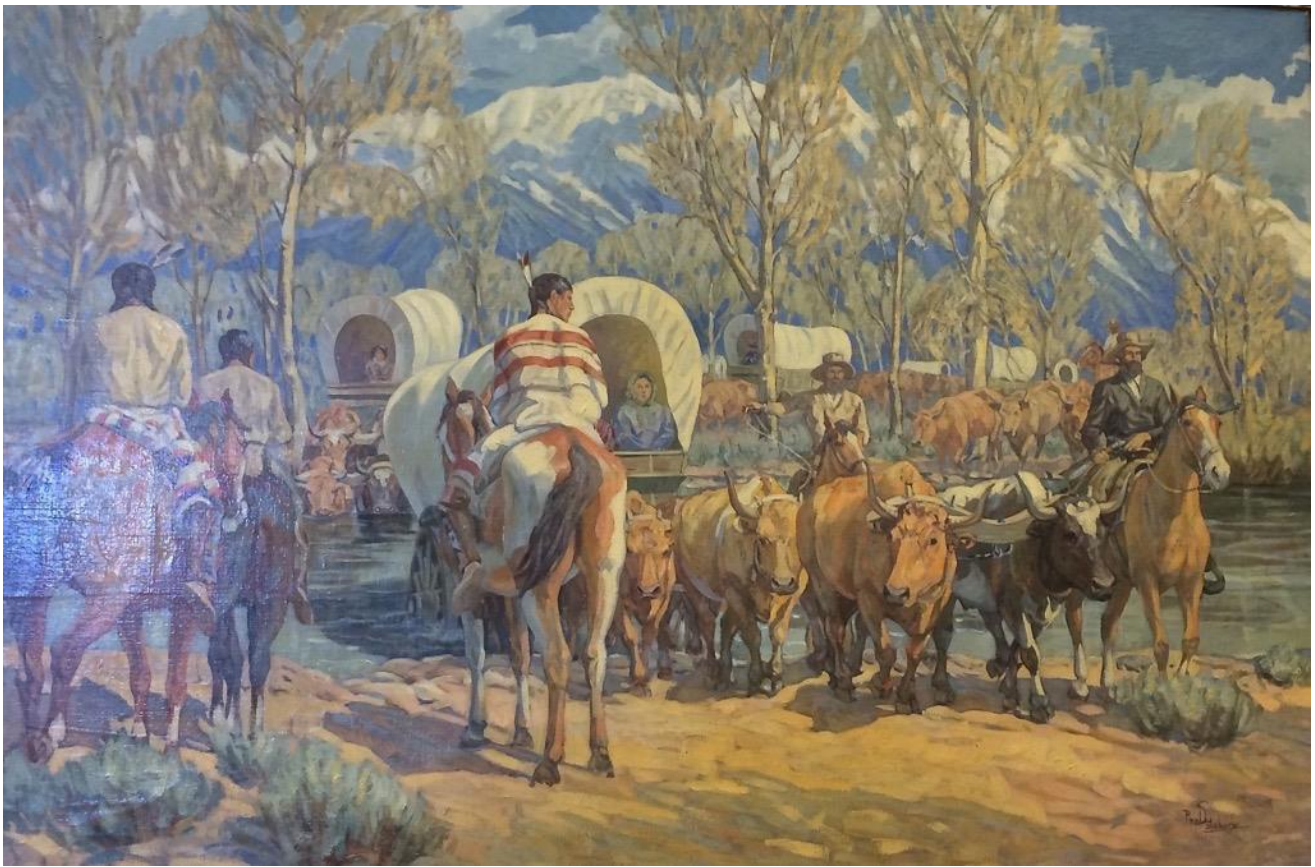

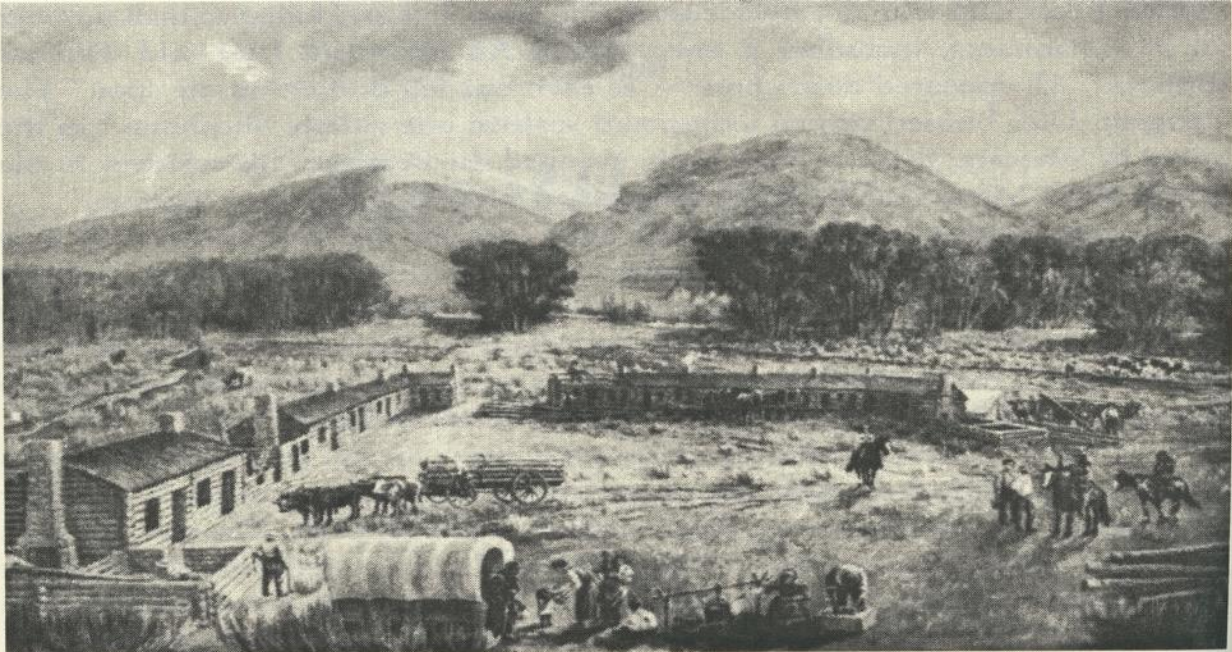

Names of Christ in the Book of Mormon

Even statistically, he's the dominant figure of the Book of Mormon.

The Book of Mormon was preserved to come forth in these latter days **that Jesus is the Christ**, the Eternal God." Its purpose is to of the Nazarene to those who "ask with a sincere heart, with real intent, having faith in Christ." (*Moro. 10:4.*)

The divinity of Christ is proclaimed by prophets in the Book of Mormon. They had a conviction of his divinity because the Holy Ghost had revealed it unto them.

Through the instrumentality of the Holy Ghost, these prophets also knew that their writings were to bear testimony that Jesus is the Christ. This they solemnly did, more than I had ever realized. In a word-by-word study, I have found some form of **the Lord's name mentioned an average of every 1.7 verses in the Book of Mormon. (See Table 1.)** I have found that the Savior is referred to by one hundred **different names**—from the first reference to him as "Lord" in 1 Nephi 1:1 [*1 Ne. 1:1*] to the final reference to him as "the Eternal Judge" in Moroni 10:34. [*Moro. 10:34*] (See Table 2.)

For example, "Savior" means that Christ came to save his people from their sins. "Holy One" signifies that he is holy and without sin, being perfect in all things. "God of the Whole Earth" reflects his universal interest in all men and their redemption. "Lord of Hosts" indicates that Christ is a God of battles. And "Lord Omnipotent" means that Christ is the Lord of all, possessing all power. The names given to our Lord take on new significance when they are approached through a thoughtful and sensitive study of their meanings. His profound character, his singular mission, and his divine relationship to man are thereby more clearly revealed. Further understanding of man's relationship to Christ, the central figure of the Book of Mormon, occurs through a study of the periods of apostasy, contention, and war. Fewer references to Christ are made during these periods of darkness, probably because his influence is lessened due to the unrighteous actions of man. (See *Alma 50–59*, for example.) During periods of peace, joy, and prosperity, which come through man's keeping the commandments, the names of Christ are used profusely, indicating the abundant presence of his Spirit. (See *4 Ne. 1*, for example.) Thus, the righteous actions of the people brought the influence and blessings of Christ among them. characteristic of the Lord to convince "the Jew and Gentile verify the divine Sonship Each of the one hundred names signifies a different attribute or and what his mission represents. and was used appropriately to convey the prophets' recognition of who he is Being aware of the number of references to Christ, having an understanding of the meanings for each name, and knowing when his influence can be greatest upon the earth can inspire reverential awe for our Savior. The witness of his divinity, however, must come personally to each of us—we cannot rely exclusively on the testimonies of others. the Eternal Father, manifests the truth of it "by the power of the Holy Ghost."

The conviction that Jesus is the Christ occurs only when God, (*Moroni. 10:4.*) To the prayerful and the sincere, the Book of Mormon bears a powerful testimony that "Jesus is the Christ, the Eternal God."

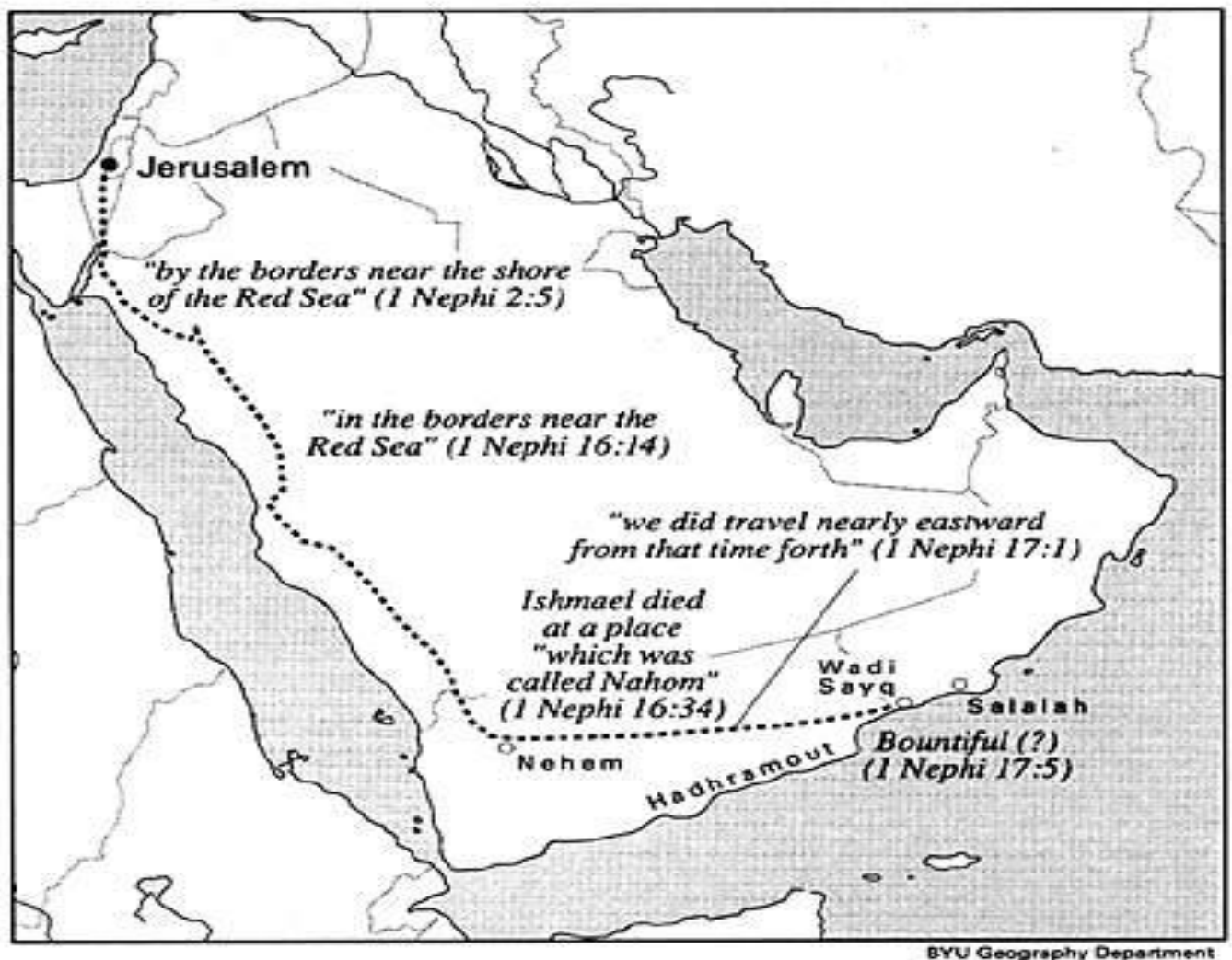

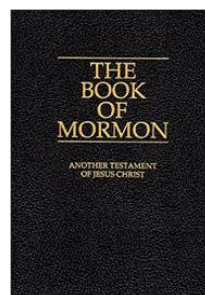

The Only True God and Jesus Christ Whom He Hath Sent

Jeffery R. Holland

Of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles

We declare it is self-evident from the scriptures that the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost are separate persons, three divine beings.

As Elder Ballard noted earlier in this session, various cross-currents of our times have brought increasing public attention to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The Lord told the ancients this latter-day work would be “a marvellous work and a wonder,”¹ and it is. But even as we invite one and all to examine closely the *marvel* of it, there is one thing we would not like anyone to *wonder* about—that is whether or not we are “Christians.”

By and large any controversy in this matter has swirled around two doctrinal issues—our view of the Godhead and our belief in the principle of continuing revelation leading to an open scriptural canon. In addressing this we do not need to be apologists for our faith, but we would like not to be misunderstood. So with a desire to increase understanding and unequivocally declare our Christianity, I speak today on the first of those two doctrinal issues just mentioned.

Our first and foremost article of faith in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is

“We believe in God, the Eternal Father, and in His Son, Jesus Christ, and in the Holy Ghost.”² We believe these three divine persons constituting a single Godhead are united in purpose, in manner, in testimony, in mission. We believe Them to be filled with the same godly sense of mercy and love, justice and grace, patience, forgiveness, and redemption. I think it is accurate to say we believe They are one in every significant and eternal aspect imaginable *except* believing Them to be three persons combined in one substance, a Trinitarian notion never set forth in the scriptures because it is not true.

Indeed no less a source than the stalwart *Harper’s Bible Dictionary* records that “the formal doctrine of the Trinity as it was defined by the great church councils of the fourth and fifth centuries is *not* to be found in the [New Testament].”³

So any criticism that The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints does not hold the contemporary Christian view of God, Jesus, and the Holy Ghost is *not* a comment about our commitment to Christ but rather a recognition

(accurate, I might add) that our view of the Godhead breaks with post-New Testament Christian history and returns to the doctrine taught by Jesus Himself. Now, a word about that post-New Testament history might be helpful. In the year A.D. 325 the Roman emperor Constantine convened the Council of Nicaea to address—among other things—the growing issue of God’s alleged “trinity in unity.” What emerged from the heated contentions of churchmen, philosophers, and ecclesiastical dignitaries came to be known (after another 125 years and three more major councils)⁴ as the Nicene Creed, with later reformulations such as the Athanasian Creed. These various evolutions and iterations of creeds—and others to come over the centuries—declared the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost to be abstract, absolute, transcendent, immanent, consubstantial, coeternal, and unknowable, without body, parts, or passions and dwelling outside space and time. In such creeds all three members are separate persons, but they are a single being, the oft-noted “mystery of the trinity.” They are three distinct persons, yet not three Gods but one. All three persons are incomprehensible, yet it is one God who is incomprehensible.

We agree with our critics on at least that point—that such a formulation for divinity is truly incomprehensible. With such a confusing definition of God being imposed upon the church, little wonder that a fourth-century monk cried out, “Woe is me! They have taken my God away from me, ... and I know not whom to adore or to address.”⁵ How *are* we to trust, love, worship, to say nothing of strive to be like, One who is incomprehensible and unknowable? What of Jesus’s prayer to His Father in Heaven that “this is life eternal, that they might *know thee* the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom *thou* hast sent”?⁶

It is not our purpose to demean any person’s belief nor the doctrine of any religion. We extend to all the same respect for their doctrine that we are asking for ours. (That, too, is an article of our faith.) But if one says we are not

Christians because we do not hold a fourth- or fifth-century view of the Godhead, then what of those first Christian Saints, many of whom were eyewitnesses of the living Christ, who did not hold such a view either?⁷

We declare it is self-evident from the scriptures that the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost are separate persons, three divine beings, noting such unequivocal illustrations as the Savior’s great Intercessory Prayer just mentioned, His baptism at the hands of John, the experience on the Mount of Transfiguration, and the martyrdom of Stephen—to name just four.

With these New Testament sources and more⁸ ringing in our ears, it may be redundant to ask what Jesus meant when He said, “The Son can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do.”⁹ On another occasion He said, “I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me.”¹⁰ Of His antagonists He said, “[They have] ... seen and hated both me and my Father.”¹¹ And there is, of course, that always deferential subordination to His Father that had Jesus say, “Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is, God.”¹² “My father is greater than I.”¹³

To whom was Jesus pleading so fervently all those years, including in such anguished cries as “O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me”¹⁴ and “My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me”?¹⁵ To acknowledge the scriptural evidence that otherwise perfectly united members of the Godhead are nevertheless separate and distinct beings is not to be guilty of polytheism; it is, rather, part of the great revelation Jesus came to deliver concerning the nature of divine beings. Perhaps the Apostle Paul said it best: “Christ Jesus ... being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God.”¹⁶

A related reason The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is excluded from the Christian category by some is because we believe, as did the ancient prophets and apostles, in an embodied—but certainly glorified—God.¹⁷ To those who criticize this scripturally based belief, I ask at least rhetorically: If the idea of an

embodied God is repugnant, why are the central doctrines and singularly most distinguishing characteristics of all Christianity the Incarnation, the Atonement, and the physical Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ? If having a body is not only not needed but not desirable by Deity, why did the Redeemer of mankind redeem *His* body, redeeming it from the grasp of death and the grave, guaranteeing it would never again be separated from His spirit in time or eternity?¹⁸ Any who dismiss the concept of an embodied God dismiss both the mortal and the resurrected Christ. No one claiming to be a true Christian will want to do that.

Now, to anyone within the sound of my voice who has wondered regarding our Christianity, I bear this witness. I testify that Jesus Christ is the literal, living Son of our literal, living God. This Jesus is our Savior and Redeemer who, under the guidance of the Father, was the Creator of heaven and earth and all things that in them are. I bear witness that He was born of a virgin mother, that in His lifetime He performed mighty miracles observed by legions of His disciples and by His enemies as well. I testify that He had power over death because He was divine but that He willingly subjected Himself to death for our sake because for a period of time He was also mortal. I declare that in His willing submission to death He took upon Himself the sins of the world, paying an infinite price for every sorrow and sickness, every heartache and unhappiness from Adam to the end of the world. In doing so He conquered both the grave physically and hell spiritually and set the human family free. I bear witness that He was literally resurrected from the tomb and, after

ascending to His Father to complete the process of that Resurrection, He appeared, repeatedly, to hundreds of disciples in the Old World and in the New. I know He is the Holy One of Israel, the Messiah who will one day come again in final glory, to reign on earth as Lord of lords and King of kings. I know that there is no other name given under heaven whereby a man can be saved and that only by relying wholly upon His merits, mercy, and everlasting grace¹⁹ can we gain eternal life.

My additional testimony regarding this resplendent doctrine is that in preparation for His millennial latter-day reign, Jesus has already come, more than once, in embodied majestic glory. In the spring of 1820, a 14-year-old boy, confused by many of these very doctrines that still confuse much of Christendom, went into a grove of trees to pray. In answer to that earnest prayer offered at such a tender age, the Father and the Son appeared as embodied, glorified beings to the boy prophet Joseph Smith. That day marked the beginning of the return of the true, New Testament gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and the restoration of other prophetic truths offered from Adam down to the present day.

I testify that my witness of these things is true and that the heavens are open to all who seek the same confirmation. Through the Holy Spirit of Truth, may we all know "the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom [He has] sent."²⁰ Then may we live Their teachings and be true Christians in deed, as well as in word, I pray in the name of Jesus Christ, amen.

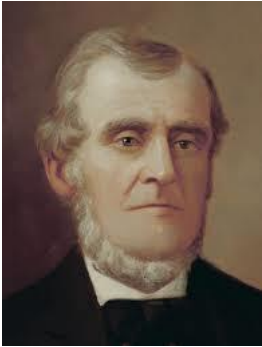
Thirty Challenges The Book of Mormon Makes To The World

12. You must invite the ablest scholars and experts to examine your text with care, and strive diligently to see that the book gets into the hands of those most eager to prove it a forgery and who are most competent to expose every flaw in it.
13. You must publish it to every nation, kindred, tongue, and people, declaring it to be "the Word of God."
14. You must write this history on the basis of what you now know.
15. You must include within the record itself this marvelous, unique, and "dangerous" promise: "And when ye shall receive these things, I would exhort you that ye would ask God, the Eternal Father, in the name of Christ, if these things are not true; and if ye shall ask with a sincere heart, with real intent, having faith in Christ, he will manifest the truth of it unto you by the power of the Holy Ghost."
16. It is to fulfill Bible prophecies, even in the exact manner in which it shall come forth, to whom given, purposes, accomplishments, etc.
17. Your description of cultures in these civilizations is not known to you when you bring forth this record. Very, very little is even claimed to be known about this civilization and its 2600 years of history.
18. Many of the facts ideas and statements given as record must be entirely consistent, even the direct opposite of the prevailing beliefs of the world.
19. Thorough investigation, scientific evidence and archaeological discovery for the next 175 years must verify its claims and prove even the most minute details to be perfectly true.
20. After over 175 years of extensive analysis no claim or fact in the book is disproved, but all is vindicated. All theories and ideas as to its origin rise and then fall, leave your own claim as the only possible one.
21. There can be no flaw whatsoever in the entire book.
22. Internal and external evidences and prophecies must be confirmed and fulfilled in the next 175 years.
23. Four honest, credible witnesses must testify to the whole world that an angel from heaven appeared to them and showed them the ancient records.
24. These four men must handle, heft, and feel the ancient engravings.
25. You must call out of heaven the voice of The Redeemer to declare to these four men.
26. Eight others in broad daylight must testify to the world that they saw and handled the ancient records.
27. They must all bear their testimony, not for profit, or gain, but under great personal sacrifice and persecution, even unto their deathbeds.
28. Thousands of great men, intellectual giants, and scholars must subscribe disciplinship to this record and its movement, even to the point of laying down their lives.
29. After suffering persecution and revilement for the next twenty years, you must then be willing to give your own life for its testimony that the record is from God.
30. Over a million missionaries must go into the world, unpaid, proclaiming your book to be the word of God.

Miracle Printing of the Book of Mormon



“**Martin Harris** One of Martin Harris’s greatest contributions to the Church, for which he should be honored for all time, was his financing the publication of the Book of Mormon. In August 1829 he mortgaged his home and farm to Egbert B. Grandin to secure payment on the printer’s contract. Seven months later, the 5,000 copies of the first printing of the Book of Mormon were completed. When he reiterated his testimony of the Book of Mormon in the closing days of his life, Martin Harris declared, “I tell you of these things that you may tell others that what I have said is true, and I dare not deny it; I heard the voice of God commanding me to testify to the same.”

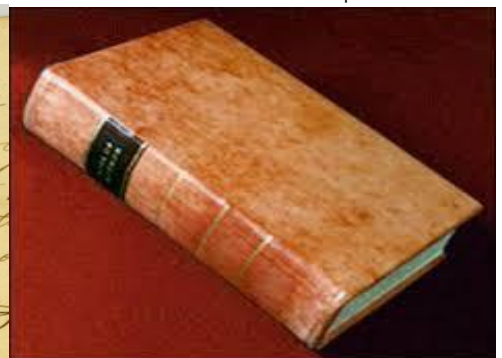

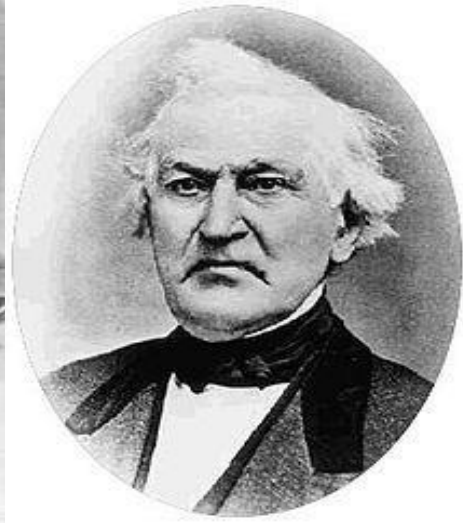

All three witnesses eventually broke with Smith and were excommunicated from the [church](#).^[1] In 1838, Joseph Smith called Cowdery, Harris, and Whitmer "too mean to mention; and we had liked to have forgotten them." Oliver Cowdery temporarily became a member of the Methodist Church, while Martin Harris adopted some Shaker beliefs. After the death of Joseph Smith, Harris and Cowdery sought rebaptism in [The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints](#)^{[3][4]} and Whitmer founded the [Church of Christ \(Whitmerite\)](#).^[5]

The Eight Witnesses

Unlike the Three Witnesses, the Eight testified that they both saw and handled the plates. Another difference is that the Eight testified they were shown the plates by [Joseph Smith](#) rather than by an angel as had the Three. Christian Whitmer died in 1835 and his brother Peter Whitmer, Jr. died the following year. In 1838, the surviving Whitmers became estranged from Joseph Smith during a leadership struggle in [Far West, Missouri](#), and all three were excommunicated with other dissenters, never to rejoin The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. **None of the Eight Witnesses is known to have denied his testimony of the authenticity of the Book of Mormon or the golden plates.**

How the Church of Jesus Christ Cared for God's Children

The church engaged in 3,909 humanitarian projects in 188 countries last year.

This outreach, an increase from 2020, included **\$906 million in expenditures** and **6.8 million hours of voluntary service** according to the church.

Emergency response

- **1 billion** vaccine doses distributed.
- **80 million** pounds of food donated.
- **Over 105,000 individual donors** at church-sponsored blood drives.
- **199 emergency response projects** in 61 countries and territories.
- **585 COVID-19 projects in 76 countries and territories.**

Blood drives were a core component of The Church of Jesus Christ's emergency response in 2021. Latter-day Saints not only make regular blood donations, according to church information, but also assist with scheduling and promoting drives, recruiting individuals to register and assisting with logistical needs on the day of a drive.

"So many Church members give the gift of life by donating blood," said American **Red Cross** CEO Gail McGovern in a press release. "We get **100,000 units of blood from the Church every year**. There is no organization, no institution anywhere, that comes close to that. From a very personal perspective, I am in awe of your community's commitment to faith and service."

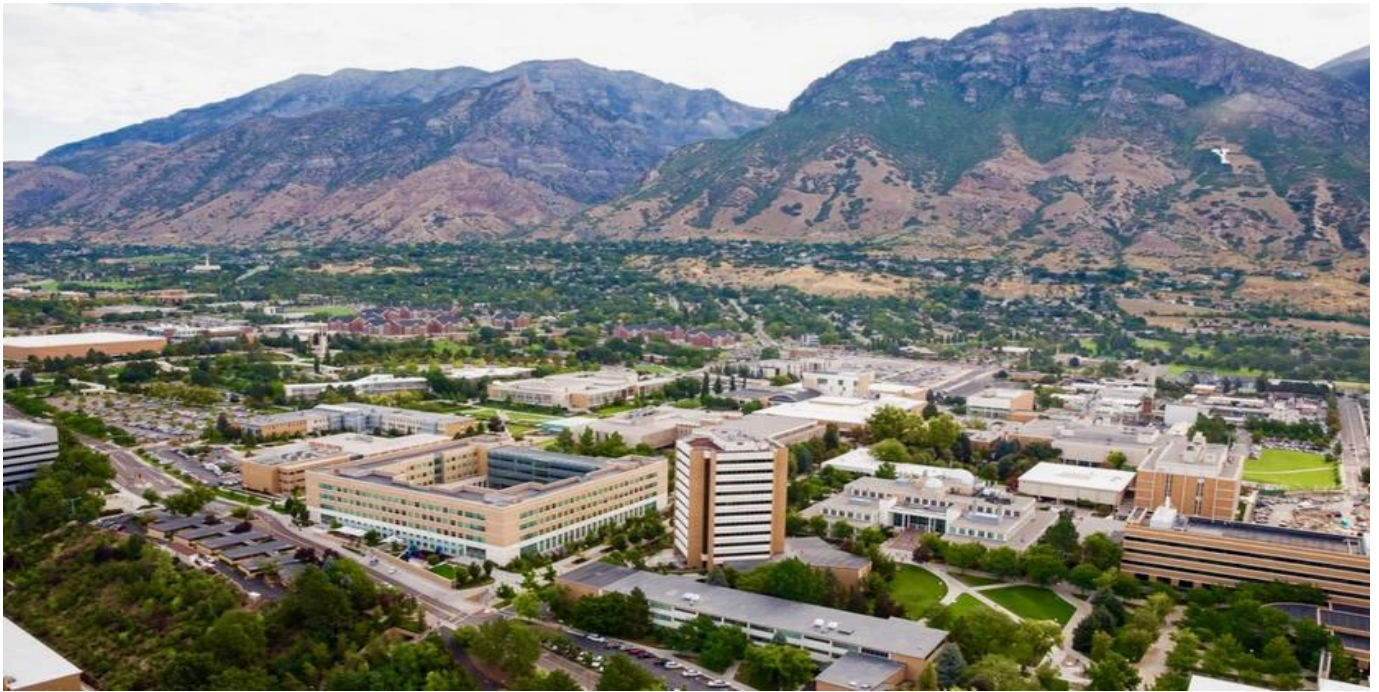

The RIGHT to Inspiration

In full reflection of the plethora of evidence here presented and with the accompaniment of a host of intellectual giants and leaders, I would add my own personal solidly anchored instance--one irrefutably stands out as a proof of the truthfulness of the Gospel.

Scripture tells us, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall DIRECT thy paths." An extremely important principle of the Gospel is here defined in these few words. It is a principle that can come to each of us only through righteousness. It is a strong principle that can help guide each of us. It tells us that there are important occasions in our lives when we should, and must draw on heavenly influences to meet the problems of the day.



In reference to this profound scripture, I will here relate a very personal incident that exemplifies and bears out this theme. This particular incident was so impressive to me that I wrote it indelibly into my personal history. I called it "The RIGHT To Inspiration." Think about that---the RIGHT to inspiration. How do you gain the right to inspiration? That may sound somewhat presumptuous, but it is true. Each of us has a right to inspiration---whether you are a leader, or serve in any leadership, at home. In any capacity there are distinct times in our lives when we reach a very critical point; even a time

of desperate determination, when we must reach beyond our own self-imposed limitations and ask for something well beyond.

Lincoln aptly described this need as he bore the agonizing burden of the great Civil war, when hundreds of thousands of brothers from both sides were being killed, slaughtered and maimed. He said, "I have been driven many times upon my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom and that of all about me seemed insufficient for that day."

I'll here relate a **very personal incident** that occurred some years ago. One that is still very fresh in my mind because it left such a lasting and profound impression. I was serving as a High Councilor in the LDS Provo, Utah Central Stake, prior to a major stake conference. I was told by our Stake President, President Thomas, that I had the assignment to be **one of two speakers**, myself and a sister as part of the **Saturday evening Stake Conference**. The two of us would both give short five-minute talks. **Boyd K. Packer**, from the Council of the Twelve would be the main speaker.

I don't know about you, but a 5-minutes talk scares me to death, especially in THAT circumstance. Any other talk, show me the podium!

As prominent as President Packer was, I knew the stake center would be absolutely packed to capacity. And remember, my assignment was for a five-minute talk! These short talks are without doubt the most difficult. The assignment was given on Saturday. I had just one week to prepare. Thereafter, my every available moment that next week was spent in earnest preparation.

My employment at that time was in Salt Lake City, so I was commuting to and from Provo, about a one-hour's drive each way. Since I was alone, coming and going, I rehearsed and changed, and changed and rehearsed, in an attempt to develop the talk I would give. Then Friday night came, and as I sat in my study making my final preparations, I **suddenly became aware** that the talk I had spent all weeklong preparing was **NOT** the talk I would give the next night. This was frightening. Here it was, the day before the night I was to deliver the talk and I felt that I had NO talk to give. And, I had only one day to prepare.

For me, writing is extremely difficult. I have written and rewritten some materials as many as seventy-five times as a foreword in one of the books I published. It is like an artist carefully choosing each appropriate color to apply to his masterpiece. There, that evening, I felt that I had done ALL that I could possibly do to prepare.

I had worked diligently and conscientiously to develop my material. And now...a hollow feeling filled my stomach. At that moment I felt that I had only one recourse.

This was the time when I must pray, pray very fervently. And fervently I did for several minutes. Then I seemed to sense a warm calm that came over me. And I proceeded to take up my ballpoint pen and placed my long yellow legal pad directly in front of me, and I waited a moment or two. Then I began to write while clearly in my mind I listened to and **recognized** the distinctive voice of **Bruce R. McConkie** of the then Council of the Twelve----**dictating to me**. He proceeded for some minutes, not too fast, just at a steady pace that I could keep up. Until he had dictated to me my entire talk. His material completely filled two and a half legal pages. I was totally taken by the moment, and I then carefully read back through it. I made only two changes and they were only punctuation marks. Well, I needed to know how long it was,

so I read it aloud to time it--- by my digital watch. I clocked five minutes and 1/10 of a second. I was completely overwhelmed. I had never experienced anything like that before in my entire life. Excited by the moment, I came upstairs from my basement study and related my extraordinary experience to my wife. It was a very personal moment of inspiration! She said, "Well, you deserved it. You worked for it." "I really did," I told her.

The next evening, I gave that talk just as it was given to me. The most interesting part about this was the fact that later I found out that the suggested material outline for all the stake conferences for that time had been prepared by Bruce R. McConkie. Numerous times since then I have reflected upon this very personal incident. It changed my life. I doubt that I will ever have another quite like it.

This type of incident may never happen to you--but to me it proves the very important point that you and I have the RIGHT to inspiration in our personal lives, particularly in our responsibilities toward others. However, the all-important KEY, I firmly believe, is that we must: **FIRST DO ALL THAT WE** can do to accomplish the intended purpose. When we have done THAT, we have fulfilled our part of the responsibility. Not until! And when we have done THAT, with sincerity and diligence, we have **EARNED** the right to ask--- keeping ourselves in tune with the spirit of inspiration and revelation.

This principle of inspiration can be applied to family, church, your job, education---any portion of your life.

Have you ever had a great need to know or do something? All of us have at some one time or another. This principle is a viable and essential part of the Restored Gospel. It is a **principle** that can come to each of us only **through righteousness**.
